Beautiful, spacious, flexible, and inviting, the new space will house both the Mac lab and our Robotics program. Intentionally open to the corridor through a huge glass window, and located on the same floor as the Science and Arts rooms, the new center will be a place where students and teachers can collaborate, build, innovate, and create.

According to Executive Director, John Wolf, "This new space will be transformational for decades to come by connecting our young men to achievement in the critical skill areas of engineering, computer science, and design. It will provide for our next generation what the first great libraries did for students in the early 20th

Boost Your Giving

Don't overlook an important charitable giving tax break—QCDs add a real boost to your donation.

If you are 70 ½ or older and have an IRA from which you need to make a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), there is a special tax break just for you. If you are thinking of a donation to San Miguel, sending that gift directly from your IRA would be a win/win for you and for the school!

When you elect to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) your funds are transferred directly from your IRA to San Miguel. The key difference between an after-tax gift and a QCD is that QCD funds are not included in your taxable federal income.

According to Fidelity Investments: In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.



all of the wonderful opportunities they have been exposed to during their time at San Miguel. The speaking portion of this event is always an important moment of the evening, as it highlights the many ways that a person's investment in our mission directly impacts the lives of students. Our community is so grateful that Carol hosts this annual appreciation dinner, as it brings the school's leadership level donors together with those who have included San Miguel in their estate plans, creating a wonderful opportunity to express our collective gratitude.

Also, QCDs don't require that you itemize, which due to the recent tax law changes, means you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction, but still use a QCD for charitable giving.

QCDs are limited to the amount that would otherwise be taxed as ordinary income. This excludes non-deductible contributions.

The maximum annual amount that can qualify for a QCD is \$100,000 (Indexed starting in 2024). This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year.

To learn more about how to give to San Miguel through your IRA or to learn about QCDs, talk with your financial advisor. A Qualified Charitable Distribution needs to be made by December 31 each year before you make any normal distributions.
